**NEPAL'S SUNDEEP JORA BECOMES YOUNGEST CRICKETER TO SCORE A T20I 50**

**NEW DELHI:** Nepal's Sundeep Jora became the youngest cricketer to score a 50 in T20 Internationals. Aged 17 years and 103 days, Jora achieved the feat during a T20 match against UAE in Dubai on Thursday. The youngster scored an unbeaten 53 off 46 balls. Earlier, the last week, another Nepalese cricketer – Rishabh Pandey (aged 16 years and 146 days) – had a moment to cherish as he broke Sachin Tendulkar's record to become the youngest male player to score a 50 in international cricket.

**India one of the favourites for ICC World Cup, says Dravid**

**DUBAI:** Former India skipper and India A coach Ravi Shastri on Friday said that India are one of the favourites for the ICC Cricket World Cup, slated to be held from May 30 in England and Wales.

"I think India are playing very good cricket at the moment and go in as one of the favourites," he said.

"Hopefully, we will peak in the next few months," Dravid was quoted as saying by the BCCI's website.

Dravid, who is also India's Under-19 coach, said England have batting-friendly wickets which could make it a high-scoring event.

"Wickets will be very flat in England and I expect there to be quite a high-scoring World Cup. Wickets like 'The Ashes' were in England with the A team. So it was really scored," Dravid said.

"A lot more runs will be scored compared to the 1999 World Cup, where we used the Duke's white ball."

**Burns ton puts Australia in control vs Sri Lanka**

**CANBERRA:** Joe Burns struck Australia's first century of the summer Friday in a stirring fightback after they lost three early wickets against a second-string Sri Lankan attack in the first-ever test here.

Australian skipper Tim Paine won the toss at the Manuka Oval and put his side in on a flat track-conditioned to bating a googly that looked to be playing off after some early wobbles. By the time they had stretched their lead to 220 for three with Burns not out 107 and Travis Head on 91 in an enormous 192-run stand.

The pair piling Australia out of a hole after they lost Marcus Harris, Usman Khawaja and Matt Renshaw cheaply to be in trouble at 23 for three. After weathering the storm and at the new ball lost its shine, the pair started cashing in, ruthlessly exposing the inexperienced attack.

Back in the side after being dropped for the series against Pakistan and India, Burns survived a dropped catch and a run-out before getting his hands on his fourth test ton in 40 balls with a bang. A big howl. Suranga Lakshman, the best bowler in Brisbane, was ruled out on the morning of the fifth ball back, with debutant Chahal taking his place. In the end, Burns had only five Test caps between them, and they initially rose to the challenge. Harris fell for 11 in the fourth over with a poorly executed square drive off left-arm Fernando Vicente. Khoaqua soon followed, last out just three balls before offering a last-gasp chance to a younger Fernando. He was caught at slip by Kusal Mendis for roughly leaving Australia on 15 for two. **APB/BS**



Kookaburra with 12 new balls, revised field restrictions (three Powerplays as opposed to the mandatory 15-over restriction in 1999) are different, so you can't compare the two World Cups," he added.

Meanwhile Sri Lankan cricket legend Aravinda de Silva predicted that the country would fall short at this year's World Cup because of corruption by officials and player indisipline.

De Silva, who captained the side

that won the 1996 World Cup, doubted that Sri Lanka would even get past the first round of the tournament that begins in England on Mar 30.

"There is corruption at the board. Players are demolished. Players are fighting with each other," said the 55-year-old.

De Silva, who is currently Sri Lanka's coach, was interviewed as preparing a new bid to take charge of Sri Lanka's Cricket Council.

He told reporters in Colombo that the national council (board) and several untrained players were responsible for the national team's recent poor performances.

Australia has the best team in the world, and in 10 years losing a win. Test series to New Zealand," he said.

Sri Lanka also lost the three-day internationals and the one-off T20 match.

**Thai court to hear Bahraini extradition request for footballer**

**BANGKOK:** A Thai public prosecutor on Friday submitted to a criminal court Bahraini's extradition request for footballer Hakeem Al Araibi, who fled his country amid political upheaval and has refugee status in Australia. Araibi will have to appear at Thailand's Criminal Court in Bangkok on Monday morning. His Thai lawyer Nadhasrin Bergman said Araibi will submit evidence to the court to fight his extradition. The case has drawn appeals from Australia's prime minister as well as FIFA for Thailand to release Araibi and send him back to Australia. **APB/BS**

**President Xi 'hates' doping, vows tough stance for Beijing 2022**

**BEIJING:** Chinese President Xi Jinping has declared that he "hates" doping, laying out a tough stance against cheating at the Beijing 2022 Winter Olympics.

Doping has overshadowed the Games in recent years, with Russian Olympians banned from last year's competition in Pyeongchang because of performance-enhancing drugs.

Doping has also tainted China's sporting record in the past decade, with some athletes stripped of Olympic medals.

Meeing with International Olympic Committee president Thomas Bach in

Beijing, Xi said he personally objected to doping and that China "is clear and very strong policy" on the use of drugs in sports.

I must hate it," Xi said at a Thursday news conference in the official Olympic website. "We prefer to have clean Chinese athletes than a gold medal, or an medal at all."

Chinese athletes who use performance-enhancing drugs will receive criminal punishment and jail terms as of this year, the official Xinhua news agency reported in December.

In 2017, a Chinese doctor told German media that there had been a systematic doping programme in China during the 2008 and 2014 across a range of sports. Back then such visits violated Beijing 2022's anti-doping rules.

For every crime we have a law, we could see what the law is. It would be after the Olympic Games so that the Chinese people can then really enjoy winter sports," **APB/BS**

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**BARCELONA BRING FORWARD JEAN-CLAIR TODIBO TRANSFER**

**BARCELONA:** Barcelona have brought forward their summer move for Jean-Claire Todibo and will sign the defender from Toulouse immediately, the Spanish club announced on Thursday. Todibo had been due to join Barca on a free transfer in July, when his contract with Toulouse was set to expire. The 19-year-old, however, has since been sidelined by the French club, prompting Barcelona to seek an earlier transfer.

**200 is just a number, says Mithali on world record**

**HAMILTON:** Back in 1999, 16-year-old schoolgirl Mithali Raj was simply happy wearing the India colours for the first time and not much changed about her life since she became the youngest member of 200 ODIs as just number 16 for 96-year-old legend.

Mithali made her ODI debut against England in Milton Keynes in January 1999 and on Friday became the first woman to complete in 200 matches in the 50-over format.

"It's a number but it's a number that I'm proud of," said Mithali, who is currently the India women's coach.

That's what I'm happy about," she said.

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
